

Aloha all,

2020 provided a time of innovation and new beginnings for Hawaii Yacht Club. It has also provided a new focus for HYC paddling, and an increase in membership of paddlers as H2O members.

Exciting news: IKAIKA/HYC members will be attending the USA Olympic Canoe and Kayak Team Trials in Florida, coached by Shelley Oates-Wilding and member Mike Twigg-Smith. These amazing members represent our intermediate and junior members of HYC. Please send support and positive energy to these members as they head out to Florida:

Nick Whitcomb, 25, one our lead coaches for the Ikaika program, has been training & racing nationally and coaching for the Ikaika Racing Team. He is also working on his doctorate in Electrical Engineering.

Kali Wilding, 18, a Mid-Pacific Academy senior, originally hails from Australia, and has represented the US and Australia in the past 4 years in World Junior and Olympic Hopes age group competitions. These trials will be her first opportunity to compete in an Open level.

Ten Kusaka, 18, a UH student, is known to train 2-3 times a day as she is inspired by her Racing Team at HYC. Ten competed in the Olympic Hopes regatta in kayaking and will be competing in the canoe event for the Open and U23 National Team.

Sean Talbert, 17, competed in his first Olympic Trials at the age of 12. He competed in the Olympic Hopes Regattas in Europe, and is the first athlete to participate in both Canoe and Kayak events in the same World competition. He aims to win the K1 200m at the Olympic Trials this year.

Tyler Dudgeon, 17, a Punahou junior, has competed in national championships as a 16 and 17 year old. He will be competing in these trials as a top seeded junior in the 1000m event, and will continue on to the World Junior Championships in Portugal.

Knytly Sybounmy, 15, is the youngest competitor going to the Olympic Trials in Florida. Knytley has competed and succeeded in National events. An accomplished waterperson in canoe, outrigger, and stand-up paddle (SUP), Knytly continues to be a role model/coach/leader.

Kitsy Nipper, 15, is our *hanai* team member who travels from San Diego. She trains and races with her IKAIKA teammates. She has competed in the Olympic Hopes Regatta in Europe and successfully competes in canoe, kayak, SUP, and surf ski on a National level.

More paddling news includes Wednesday Night Paddling Races from 5-6 pm, pending DOBOR permits. Plans are to commence in the month of April. These races are a collaboration with the HYC, Coach Shelley Oates-Wilding, and the support of the other water programs at HYC.




Aloha,

Transpac 2021 excitement builds and there are currently 56 Entries. **With the first of three starts now less than 5 months away, the 51<sup>st</sup> edition of the biennial Los Angeles to Honolulu race will have the first race start on July 13, second race start July 16, and the third race start July 17, 2021.** For general information, go to the Transpac website <https://transpacyc.com/> and check out the Notice Board, Entry List, for the current list of yachts entered for the race.

HYC has always been a big supporter of this event and we are positioned to be in the center of the action. During 2019 HYC hosted the Transpac rum party and provided mooring for the CAL 40 fleet that stacked up on the Aloha Dock during their stay. We anticipate filling up the Aloha Dock again this year.

HYC should plan to host visiting yachts and the boats that will be moored along the 500 Row in the Ala Wai Harbor (approximately 25-30 boats). Typically, boats moored at WYC and HYC will have their hosting party at the respective yacht club. Boats moored at the 500 Row "Transpac Row" will have their parties at "party island." Every arriving guest boat needs a hosting party team.

If you don't know who to contact to be a volunteer and be a part of the action, please email me and I can connect you with the appropriate person. It is not too early to start planning this major event. With the help of the harbor, other clubs, volunteers, and HYC membership, the 2021 Honolulu Committee looks forward to a safe and successful 2021 Transpac. Thank you in advance for your help.

He has been--and will be an--intermittent visitor on the Aloha Dock till he casts off for Alaska this summer. If you see his beautiful yawl tied up, don't hesitate to say, "hi" or to buy him a beer.

After 13 months of nearly constant sailing, SV *J. Henry*, a Hinckley Bermuda 40, arrived in Hawaii. We landed at Hawaii Yacht Club's Aloha Dock the morning of December 8<sup>th</sup>, 2020. Hawaii was not on the itinerary, but after waiting in French Polynesia for 9 months, hoping for Western borders to open, we had to surrender our circumnavigation plans.

The original Apparent Winds' crew consisted of my good friend Zach as mate and myself as captain. In October of 2018, we were at our home in Charleston, SC waiting for a hurricane to pass through.

There was nothing to do for about a week, so we got to talking. After a few days and a few beers, we had made the decision to sail around the world. A year later we were sailing out of Charleston Harbor with a borrowed boat and a newly formed company and film contract to document the journey. The project we began is titled "Apparent Winds" and the documentary we set out to help film is titled "Sea Change." In short, our mission is to sail around the world, documenting our adventure as well as meeting with and learning from people and organizations who are working to preserve and restore the natural environment and their culture in the face of a changing climate and a globalizing world.

We were on a quick ride around the world, sailing from Charleston to Bermuda and then south through the West Indies as far south as Grenada and then West towards Panama. By February 2020, we were finally in Pacific waters, sitting at the dock in Panama City and preparing for our Pacific crossing to the Marquesas. As we sailed from Panama, we were met with seas and wind on our nose. We decided to turn for the Galapagos to fill our fuel. The last thing I wanted was to be floating just outside of the Marquesas for an extra week because we didn't have the fuel to kick into the harbor. After 48 hours anchored in San Cristobal, we lifted our anchor and set sail out of the archipelago. Whales, rays, and blue footed boobies were abound. The waters there were teeming with life! We sailed for another 21 days and in the early morning with the spinnaker flying, we sailed past the Eastern point of the island of Hiva Oa. I hope I never forget how I felt while I was on watch alone, the spin up, brushing my teeth over the side of the boat, the moon behind us and the mass of land glowing in the grey light just to our starboard. We had made it across and were finally able to touch land after a passage totaling 31 days. We were prepared to enjoy 2 or 3 weeks in French Polynesia before sailing on to the Cook Islands, Tonga and Westward on and on. 2020 had other plans. One week after our arrival, Zach was on a plane to quarantine with his girlfriend back home and I was preparing for a month of living aboard *J.Henry* in a strict quarantine in Tahauku Bay, Hiva Oa.

Long story short, I lived and sailed in French Polynesia for 9 months as opposed to 2 weeks. We continued our mission and our documentation as well as we could, although we were running out of stories to cover and COVID fears kept many people out of reach. Five months after our arrival in French Polynesia, Zach returned and together we decided to change our route and forfeit this circumnavigation. We considered sailing East through the Gambier, South to Pitcarin Island, to Rapa Nui and then across to Chile. After one day of sailing against the wind, we decided the upwind route was not for us; *J. Henry* much prefers the wind at the beam or aft. It took us eight long hours to travel 20 miles from Raiatea to Huahine. That night I told Zach that I think we should sail to Hawaii. He was thinking the same thing. Hawaii it was.



Right now we should be in South Africa. We're not, but I'm thrilled to be here. When we arrived, Zach went back home to South Carolina for good. The hospitality at HYC has made our landing back in the USA easy. HYC has become a bit of a home away from home and will be *J.Henry's* home port while the vessel is here. Since our arrival in Hawaii, I have decided to Sail North to Alaska in June. I will then work my way back down the North and Central American Coasts before transiting the canal and returning to South Carolina for Christmas 2021. Until our departure in June, I will be sailing up down and all around the Hawaiian Islands.
