

We are also offering some drink specials for the lunch hour and you no longer have to go to the bar to get your drinks. You will be served 100% at your table because this fits with the social distancing recommendations. Our goal is giving exceptional customer service to you and your guests. We are having weekly galley and bar meetings to work out the kinks and to get it right. Mike Clause has agreed to oversee this venture for the club and work with Ikaika to make it a success.

And lastly, we have posted information on the notice board about a new "H2O" membership category which we will be voting on at our next membership meeting. BOARD OF GOVERNORS

Aloha members,

Along with the completely refurbished bar and dining area, new galley, and new junior program Ikaika that greeted us on our return to the Club, the Commodore, Vice Commodore, and the Board are proposing a new membership category: "H2O." A description of the H2O membership category has been posted on the bulletin board downstairs and will be up for a bylaws vote at the July membership meeting.

The pandemic shutdown has offered all of us the opportunity to really think about what is important, and it isn't just money, even though a club always needs funding. We had already been talking about how to stop the constant price creep (other than inflation raises in our rules) that limits membership, and open the club for fun, recreation, and more members, while still keeping HYC focused on its mission of boating and ocean participation.

We believe the H2O membership addresses also the perennial problem of Senior and Life membership dues not being enough to sustain the club, an issue which has been discussed and debated for years. With a broader membership base, Senior and Life memberships will be sustainable.

The H2O membership category would replace the Social and Associate membership categories, streamlining our membership categories while offering an attractive option to new, and some current members, by creating a lower-cost option for belonging to HYC. There is no Hawaii residency or out-of-state residency requirement for the H2O membership.

An H2O member will be a non-voting member and there will be no companion/spouse card. An H2O member cannot join the slip wait list, have a slip, have a boat locker, or get a parking pass. Current members who wish to change to H2O membership, or those who initially join in this category, cannot switch (back) to regular membership for three years. There will be no eligibility for Senior or Life membership as that is premised on years as a Regular member.

An H2O member can invite three guests (instead of regular membership's seven guests), participate in all club events, have unlimited use of regular club facilities, rent boats, rent personal watercraft storage, and generally enjoy membership privileges.

What makes this membership category so different and appealing are the affordable fees:

- \$100 initiation fee;
- \$620 yearly dues (for this year, prorated, to increase with all other dues 3% per year);
- Monthly minimum of \$25.
- Three hours per quarter of volunteer time, preferably gate watch, or pay \$25 fee.
- All fees and dues must be paid through Square automatic withdrawal, easing our bookkeeping burden and ensuring smooth funding of the club.

H2O fits nicely with the new kayak/surfski rack rental space we now have; adult fitness paddlers can participate with Ikaika; and it may encourage Friday night crews to become members. Many people have enjoyed the club constantly while not joining, which is not sustainable for the club. Now that joining HYC will be in reach of a wider range of budgets, we will be enforcing the Club rules that nonmembers may not buy drinks at HYC.

Your Commodore, Vice Commodore, and Board of Governors are asking you to vote for this Bylaw change.

The July General Membership Meeting is also the time for members to vote for the Chairperson of the Nominating Committee.

SAILING REPORT - HISTORY

A Short History of the Corinthian Spirit and the Value of Selfless Service (3rd of 3-Part Series)

I have been awed and touched by the volunteerism of our club members and employees this year. There were a multitude of people (at least 21 to be exact) who were invaluable to me and the club in executing the 2020 HYC Kokohead Race. Race committee has been so awesome and flexible in getting Friday night racing back on track. Many other volunteers and leaders have worked incredibly hard to establish new programs at our club, optimize our business operations, and market our club events. I can't even begin to count the number of people and hours of sweat given to refurbish our great new bar and restaurant areas. This has made me reflect upon those successes to realize that not a single HYC accomplishment stands on the shoulders of one person. It is the foundation of the Corinthian spirit upon which those people volunteered, specifically its inherent characteristic of selfless service.

As I mentioned in last month's *Bulletin*, I instituted a code of conduct for the HYC Sailing Program included in all sailing instructions. This code of conduct is based upon the high standard of the Corinthian Spirit. But I asked myself, what is original history of the Corinthian Spirit term and its modern-day nautical usage? I offer this much abbreviated history and I hope you find it as interesting and inspiring I as do.

The word 'Corinthian' has been around for over 2000 years and early on was associated with people of excess in the ancient city of Corinth. A.N. Wilson, in his book *Paul: The Mind of an Apostle*, wrote that the city was, "a place of proverbial wickedness, energy, riches, noise."¹⁻² Saint Paul himself confirmed such opinions and concerns, regarding the many immoralities and excesses of the city in his first letter to the Corinthians⁷. Corinthians were, at best, less than savory, rough around the edges, and a bit lazy or, at worst, rabble rousers, playboys and generally debaucherous. Interestingly, this ancient Greek city-state had a tremendous reputation for its naval innovations and skills.

There seems to be a large gap between ancient times and approximately the year 1599 when Shakespeare used the term in his play *Henry the IV*, Part 1, to have Hal, the Prince of Wales (to become the future King Henry V), described himself akin to the commoner who is strong in character but a bit on the rowdy side. Hal stated, "I am no proud Jack, like Falstaff, but a Corinthian, a lad of mettle, a good boy, by the Lord, so they call me..." going on further to brag that, "I can drink with any tinker in his own language during my life."³ Notwithstanding a mention of the term in similar fashion by Herman Melville in his 1849 seafaring novel *Redburn*,⁴ the term, in relation to maritime activities, reappears in about the 1870s-1880s. At this point it started to become adopted by sportsman and clubs, where it morphed from a term to describe someone of relatively negative character to one with desirable characteristics. Some of the earliest uses of the term 'Corinthian' in yachting that I could identify were by The Royal Corinthian Yacht Club (RCYC) of Britain in 1872 and The Seawanhaka Yacht Club (SYC) in New York, established in 1871. SYC claimed to be the first Corinthian yacht club, but did not add it to their name until 1881, to become the Seawanhaka Corinthian Yacht Club (SCYC).⁴⁻⁶ RCYC has long valued amateurism since its inception with its official history stating the club "has produced many fine amateur helmsmen and women, including national and international champions of all ages, upholding its earliest objective, "to encourage amateur yacht sailing."⁶ RCYC's history further states that in the time of the club's establishment, yachting society began to give way from professionally paid crews to opportunities for amateur participation, where, "There was little scope for amateurs in such a set-up." A healthier tide however set in as Corinthianism spread among certain yacht clubs."

SAILING REPORT - HISTORY (CONT.)

The RCYC's constitution then came to require, "that with the exception of the paid hand, the crews should consist of members of the Club... the Corinthian Yacht Club will therefore practically consist of a number of yacht owners anxious to encourage amateur yacht sailing and of such of their friends as may be willing to assist."

The RCYC history states that the word 'Corinthian' "was derived from the Isthmian games of the Greeks held at Corinth in honor of Poseidon."⁶ What's more, ancient Greek historians suggest that the games were infused with a Corinthian spirit and open to any and all comers. Even though Corinth and Athens were often at war during the the games, Corinth invited the Athenians to the games,⁷ provided them with the privilege of front row seats,⁸ and granted Athenian athletes safe passage to the games through the war zones.⁹ This demonstrates the egalitarian and humanitarian nature of the Isthmian games, with the resultant implication that late 19th century people would have made the connection between that history and the positive interpretation of the word 'Corinthian.' But as the RCYC's official history acknowledges, "It's a long jump from Corinth to Kent" and I had difficulty filling the gaps between 582 BC and 1871 AD. Nevertheless, in a relatively short period, the world of sports rehabilitated the word 'Corinthian,' from one of condemnation to one of praise, as it gradually shifted to celebrate amateurism and exemplary sportsmanship.



TECHNOLOGY REPORT

Aloha everyone,

I want to extend a huge *mahalo* to the members who donated to make the internet upgrade project a great success. We were able to raise \$1,800! That's \$300 over our goal of \$1,500. This extra money was used to purchase two additional access points to extend the range of our WiFi network. I'm happy to report that the new WiFi equipment is 80% installed and the network speeds are blazing fast compared to the old equipment. Just a reminder, you can only access these new speeds as a member if you register your device at the office; otherwise, your speeds will be super slow (guest access speeds).

We'll also be changing the name of our WiFi network from HYC-1 to HYC Members WiFi. There used to be a network called "HYC - Members," which no longer exists. We will also most likely be removing the password requirement for the network, and instead, be replacing it with a captive portal with terms and conditions. This means that you'll be prompted to accept the terms after selecting the network, similar to other public WiFi networks such as Starbucks or McDonalds.



New Access Point

Our next goal for upgrading the technology at Hawaii Yacht Club is to add a security camera system. Brian Malecek, owner of Envision Networks, graciously donated equipment and labor to this effort. We need to raise an additional \$1,500 to completely cover the equipment costs (we've already raised \$400 through word of mouth.) You can chip in, too, at <https://bit.ly/hycsecurity>. If you donate at least \$150 you'll be included in the donor group for unrestricted speed on our new WiFi network.

I want to reiterate that you need to register your device for fast access to the internet; it will be extremely slow otherwise. Guests will have the option to get a 24-hour pass that allows them fast access to the internet, most likely with a purchase at the bar or restaurant. Our goal is to make the fast WiFi a positive benefit for members.


